If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The institute has an information management system to manage the information related to students and faculty. Currently the modules being used are: 1. Attendance module, 2. Internal assessment module, and 3. Time table module. With the use of this information management system, faculty submits the month wise attendance which is further uploaded on the website for students. In case of any discrepancy or for students with short attendance, timely information is sent to the students so that they can maintain the minimum eligibility of attendance (as per University of Delhi norms) to appear in examinations. Similarly, the semester wise time table of of all courses is uploaded on the website before the beginning of each semester for the students. The software enables to check the clashes in time table so that they are removed well in advance. The internal assessment is submitted to the college using this management software which is uploaded on website after scaling the marks according to the weightage as per respective syllabus. In the finance section, a Payroll System is being used to manage the salary, advances, purchases related issues.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Steps are taken to ensure optimal teaching time by beginning classes on Day 1 of the semester. Timetables and teaching plans are prepared and informed to the students well in advance. Students are informed about not just teaching schedules but about internal exam dates as well learning outcomes of the course in the Orientation session at the beginning of the session. Mid term assessment of syllabus covered is done through student faculty meetings twice during the semester. Minutes of all department and student faculty meetings are recorded and minutes maintained properly. Remedial classes are taken wherever required. Multiple opportunities are given for internal assessment so that students have chances to improve their marks. Classroom teaching is augmented through the e learning portal which covers all topics in every course. These are designed to help the students revise at their own pace. They can take tests and submit assignments in the virtual space even during holidays. Smart classrooms have been set up in order to use multimedia aids to augment pedagogy. Periodic feedback also helps in curriculum delivery and learning. Likewise, curriculum delivery is enhanced through learning beyond the classrooms via increased institute - industry interface and field visits and educational excursions. Student driven projects, group discussions and regular assignments help students keep pace with pedagogy.

discussed in department meetings. This helps in factoring students needs and aspirations and the same is factored in the planning of lectures/ seminars and conferences. Factoring in students needs, an emotional and counseling cell was set up and professional help was sought to mentor and guide students in self analysis and stress and anger management. Six such workshops were organised which were very well received by the students. Feedback after each workshop was taken and shared with the counselling experts who modulated their workshops accordingly. Feedback from girls lead to self defence workshops and legal awareness workshop was also organised after feedback from students. Parents feedback was also documented and analysed after faculty parents meetings. This feedback was shared with department faculty and necessary steps to augment mentoring and teaching was taken accordingly. Regular feedback from hostelers is taken in various meetings and the same is factored in running of the hostel, planning of events and other student related activities. Short term and skill enhancement courses were planned and introduced only after taking feedback of students needs and interests. Student alumni meetings are organised regularly every semester in order to help students explore career avenues and steps to be taken towards their career goals. This is organised after feedback from students as to which career options need to be discussed every semester. Wide and varied opportunities are hereby covered.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Maharaja Agrasen College is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. The endsemester exams are conducted by the University but held in the college. The examination committee has reinforced norms for the conduct of the examinations and made all faculty aware of these norms before the commencement of the exams. Preference of faculty regarding dates of invigilation duties is taken and factored in while preparing the duty chart. Duty chart of invigilation duty is prepared and circulated much in advance to ensure presence of faculty during exams. Flying squads comprising of faculty ensured that use of unfair means was checked. Departments have also taken steps to streamline internal exams. Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluations were undertaken through class tests, assignment problems, Case Studies and Projects Multiple assignments were given to students, topics were given in advance to enable them to prepare. The best of 2/3 assignments were submitted for their internal assessment data. Those students who did not perform well in the assignment were counseled individually and when required, weaker students were given more chances to improve their scores. This led to an improved outcome as there was no/lesser performance anxiety. UGC SC/ST Cell has been conducting meetings with students and faculty to look at the remedial measures for helping students. Extra classes by teachers and group classes on general but very important topics like taxation, etc Students involved in cocurricular and sports activities who missed the first test could appear in the second/ third round. Mentoring Counselling Committee in collaboration with Zyego Student Counselling Services organized workshop to help students deal with examination stress related issues.

The academic calendar prepared by the University of Delhi indicating the3 start of academic session, mid semester breaks, last day of teaching and end sesmester examination was stictly adhered to by the college. Departments prepared their academic calendar in consultation with faculty of their departments. Activities were planned in order to minimize disturbance of teaching schedules. All departments submitted not just their calendar of activities in advance but also the budget for the same in order to minimize time spent on approvals.

The Green Committee (GAC) was formed based on the recommendations of IQAC. A Tree Plantation Drive was organized by Green Action Committee in the college premises on September 8, 2018 GAC formulated

detailed policies with action plan for waste collection and disposal in light of the objective of the college to reduce the carbon footprint. • Paper Waste Management Policy Goal: Minimize the impact of paper use by improving the environmental characteristics of purchased paper and by lowering total paper use. • Paper Recycling College has atie up with NGO Jaagruti for a nonmonetary inkind exchange of recycled paper products against the quantities of various grades of paper collected from Maharaja Agrasen College for the purpose of recycling. • E Waste Management Policy Maharaja Agrasen College, as a responsible stakeholder, realizes the adverse impact of ewaste on environment and health due to improper disposal of ewaste. The Green Action Committee initiated the adoption of best practices for ewaste recycling available. It was decided to follow the mechanism for channelisation of ewaste from 'end of life' products to dismantlers or recyclers registered with Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) • Waste Management in Chemistry Laboratory Guidelines for chemical waste management policy in chemistry and biology laboratory were framed based on 3 steps: Minimise, Recycle and Disposal as per Chemical/Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) guidelines • Go Green Initiatives of Vidyottma Girls' Hostel Complete ban on use of plastic in the hostel (i) Replace all plastic cups and plates in mess with steel utensils. (ii) Use of jute bags Awareness Derive: (i) Poster making competition on theme 'My Green Hostel' on 3rd February 2019, (ii) Segregation of biodegradable and nonbiodegradable waste, (iii) Collection drive for paper, plastic and electronic wastes, (iv) Air purifier plants were placed in the rooms of the students

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Skill Enhancement initiatives: As per various surveys, more than half of all graduates are not employable in any sector based on industry standards. There is a definite disconnect between the skillsset and aptitude of the majority of graduates and the needs of the industry. In Industry, at entry level there is an expectation from a graduate to be preequipped with certain skills such as communication, interpersonal behavior, English fluency, team work, and basic computer knowledge. Keeping this in mind, various new initiatives were taken: • Shortterm Courses: Shortterm Courses for students were launched by the college for the first time. The main objective to start shortterm courses in the college was to augment the undergraduate course curriculum, to empower student to meet challenges after graduating from college and to enhance the soft skills of the students. Following courses were launched by the college S.No. Course 1 Introduction to Data Science for Business using R Programming Language 2 Data Analysis for Business Decision Making 3 Sugam Sangeet 4 Mobile App Designing: Level 1 5 English Skills for Professional Success: Level 1 • Skill Based Programme Under Community College Scheme: The 12th Five Year Plan Document of the Planning Commission has also laid a special emphasis on expansion of skillbased programmes in higher education and introduced Community College (CC) scheme for its implementation. Under this scheme college was chosen to start Advanced Diploma In TV Programme And News Production programme to serve multiple needs including (i) Career oriented education and skills to students interested in directly entering the workforce (ii) Hightouch remedial education for secondary school graduates not ready to enroll in traditional colleges, giving them a path to transfer to three or four year institutions (iii) General interest courses to the community for personal development and interest. The curriculum of this course is designed to equip the students with an intellectual and interdisciplinary approach that prepares them for the Industry. The learning process aims to strike a balance between the theoretical and practical approach to the field. Syllabus of the course is in alignment with National Occupational Standard of the Sector Skills Council and NVEQF /

NSQF. Syllabus has been developed in consultation with the industry professionals, academicians Media Entertainment Skill council. In order to make education relevant and to create `industry fit' skilled workforce, the college will be in constant dialogue with the industry so that they remain updated on the requirements of the workforce in the industry. The course offers creditbased modular programmes, wherein banking of credits is permitted so as to enable multiple exit and entry. This would enable the learner to seek employment after any level of certification and join back as and when feasible to upgrade her/his qualification/skill competency either to move higher in her/his job or in the higher educational system. This will also provide the learner an opportunity to move from vocational stream to general stream and viceversa, subject to fulfilling the entry qualifications. • Skill Enhancement Workshops: Hands on workshop facilitate better learning and impart the necessary skill set to the students. College organized many skill enhancement workshops in 2018 19. Some of the major workshops organised by the college were: Fact Checking and Online Verification, Technical Writing and Communication Skills, English Language Proficiency Workshop, Election Survey Analysis, Digital Marketing, Growth Hacking and Big Data, Machine Learning, Logistics Supply Chain Management and workshop on Kangra Miniature Painting. 2. Agrasen Baroji Help Initiative (ABHI): In 2011, Maharaja Agrasen College offered a collaborative hand to residents of Baroji Village in the Nuh (Mewat) district of Haryana in order to synergize the dynamism of our students, faculty and the natives of Baroji. The attempt was to blur boundaries and to understand their core issues with the aim to extend our resources to them. Multiple visits by students and faculty to Baroji every year have led to a relationship based on mutual understanding and trust. They are now an integral part of the college and the college takes pride in its association with the residents of Baroji. Students helped in setting up a Library and sports facilities for the residents of Baroji. They also helped in spreading awareness about government policies and their implementation through screening of films. The past six years have seen a bond develop and strengthen and the college seeks to engage more and more students in different extension activities at Baroji to enable wider participation and to synergize core competencies in a dynamic association. The College had also synergized the ambitious Swachhta Abhiyan launched by the Honourable Prime Minister, a team of fifty students undertook various Cleanliness Drives within the village. Also, numerous sensitization programs on sanitation and hygiene were brought forth. A three day camp was organized in Baroji village in 2019 with an objective to interact with villagers, hold plantation drives, workshop for villagers to apprise them about government policies for them. • SPICMACAY VIRASAT: Maharaja Agrasen College collaborated with SPIC-MACAY (The Society for Promotion of Indian Culture and Music among Children and Youth) since the last few years to educate the students on art, music, and dance and to engage them on matters of Indian Heritage and culture. This academic year saw artistic performances and aesthetic engagements by scholars and artists held under the 'Virasat Week' from 28 February 2019 - 4 February 2019, to hone the musical and visual talents of the students. Ranging from Kathaklecdem Performance by Sushri Rani Khanamji and Hindusthani Vocal lecdem recital by Pandit Bhuvanesh Komkali to a Heritage Walk to the National Gallery of Modern Art, New Delhi conducted by Mr. Argha and a fiveday workshop on Kangra Miniture Painting conducted by Dr Sneh Gangal, the 'Virasat Week' underlined the interface of art, music, tradition, and history.
